

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

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


WORKSHOP ON POSITIVE PSYCHOTHERAPY



Observations and Key Takeaways:



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


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AAHAR- The International Food and Hospitality Fair

Key Feature of the Session: The role of Microorganisms in Food & Beverage Industries.

Key Insights: Fermentation is an anaerobic biological process of metabolism in which an organism converts a carbohydrate, such as starch or sugar, into alcohol or an acid. Microorganisms like yeast and bacteria usually play a role in the fermentation process, creating beer, winc, bread, kimchi, yogurt, and other foods. Yeasts are used in alcoholic fermentation to make bread. Yeast converts sugar to carbon dioxide and alcohol in the absence of oxygen, causing the dough to rise. The alcohol evaporates and the yeast is killed because of the heat from baking the bread.

Students Learning: Students of Biotechnology, Microbiology, Biomedical Engineering, Food Technology & Hotel Management eagerly participated, grabbing the opportunity to learn about fermentation technology through bread-making sessions. This interactive session not only fostered engagement but also empowered students with practical knowledge and a deeper understanding of industrial microbiology.

Roles: Overall scientific aspects of Fermentation and the importance of microbes in Industrial Microbiology were delivered by Professor V. Samuel Raj. 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

The primary aim as to why we are conducting this legal aid competition at such a large level is to disseminate legal awareness amongst the people of society a special focus is on the students or elderlypeople to make them aware of their basic rights and a little knowledge about the laws that can help them to claim certain benefits. Under the head of speed mentoring, we conducted speed mentoring sessions to provide mentoring to students on certain specific topics like child abuse and child harassment, the right to education, etc. The speed mentoring sessions were conducted for 1 hour, and we reserved 10 minutes to deal with any kind of query related to a topic that a student wants clarification upon.

The outcome of the sessions and the feedback we received while conducting them were remarkable. The active engagement of the students in the mentoring sessions is one such factor that has enhanced the overall portrayal of the mentoring sessions.



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IMPACT & WAY FORWARD

Impact of the speed mentoring session on the children:

As we stated that the event allowed them to receive advice from multiple mentors in a short time period. We appreciated that they gained new insights, reflected on their own careers, and were ableto give back to their field. There are also some other impacts of the speed mentoring session which are as follow:

- 1. Boosting Confidence: Through these short interactions, children may receive encouragement and positive feedback from mentors. This validation can boost their confidence and self- esteem, helping them believe in their abilities and potential.
- 2. Enhanced Communication Skills: The short and focused nature of speed mentoring requires both mentors and mentees to articulate their thoughts concisely. This improved the children's communication skills and their ability to express themselves effectively.
- 3. Inspiration and Motivation: Seeing young and ambitious law students achieving their goals can serve as a source of motivation and inspiration for the children. It was instilling a beliefin their own abilities and encourage them to work hard towards their own aspirations, regardless of the challenges they may face.
- 4. Exposure to New Ideas and Knowledge: Speed mentoring Session also introduce children to new ideas, concepts, and experiences they might not have encountered otherwise. This exposure stimulates their curiosity and foster a love for learning.
- 5. Building Social Skills: our speed mentoring sessions involve brief but meaningful interactions. This will help children in developing their social skills, such as communication, active listening, and networking, which are valuable in various aspects of life.

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SPEED MENTORING SESSIONS

The speed mentoring sessions organized by SRM University students in 10 schools as part of the CEERA legal aid initiative aimed to empower students with legal knowledge and awareness in a fun and interactive manner while creating a positive impact on society by addressing critical topics suchas Domestic Violence, Child Abuse and Child Sexual Harassment, Right to Education, Child Marriage, and Rights of the elderly/senior citizens. These dynamic sessions provided a unique platform for aspiring legal aid advocates to engage in providing legal guidance and assistance to school students and teachers which are the key building block of all civilized societies. The law students creatively engaged the students through skits, video presentations, counselling, mentoringon POSCO (Protection of Children from Sexual Offences), "Ask a Lawyer" Q&A sessions, and competitions like the "Right to Education" Legal Quiz. Additionally, the sessions featured exciting activities like the Legal Puppet Show and the Legal-Aid Treasure Hunt, all designed to make legal awareness accessible and enjoyable for the students. The aim of these sessions is to create responsiblecitizens who are aware of their legal rights and responsibilities.





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OVERVIEW OF MENTORING SESSIONS

The speed mentoring sessions were carefully coordinated with each school hosted by mentors who were passionate about empowering the next generation. Participants, typically law students and young legal enthusiasts, were divided into groups, creating a diverse and enriching environment. The sessions were designed to be interactive and engaging, allowing for candid discussions and personalized guidance.

Activity 1: Skit to Raise Awareness about Senior Citizens' Rights and Child Rights:

To start the speed mentoring session, the law students prepared a thought-provoking skit that highlighted the challenges faced by senior citizens and children concerning their rights. The skit depicted scenarios where elderly individuals experienced neglect or mistreatment, and children were subjected to child labour and denied their right to education. 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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Street Vendor Engagement Report is an inclusive study of the legal issues that are faced by the street vendors in India which aims to cast light upon the challenges they regularly face through a meticulous examination. The report also recognizes the significant role that the street vendors as they offer reasonably priced items and assistance in neighborhoods all around the country. The report starts with underlining the aim and the importance of this report in a manner which explores its key reasons and relevance. 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INTRODUCTION

"The challenges faced by street vendors are a testament to their indomitable spirit, as they transform adversity into opportunity on a daily basis." - Kofi Annan

Street vending as a profession has been in existence in India since time immemorial. Street vendors form a very important component of the urban informal sector in India with increasing urban migration and the shrinking formal sector, hawking and street vending have emerged as one of the critical means of earning a livelihood for the urban poor in India. Today, vending is an important source of employment for many urban poor as it requires low skills and small financial inputs. People engaged in vending try to solve their problems through their own meagre resources. Unlike other sections of the urban population, they do not demand that the government create jobs for them, nordo they engage in begging, stealing or extortion. It appears that irrespective of the location and typeof vendors, they try to live their life with dignity and self-respect through regular vending activities. According to a study conducted by the **National Association of Street Vendors of India (NASVI)**, Mumbai has the largest number of street vendors numbering around 250,000. Kolkata has more than 2,00,000 street vendors. Patna have around 80,000 and Indore, Bangalore and Bhubaneshwar have around 30,000 street vendors. In Ahmedabad it is estimated to be about 80000 and half of them are women and organized by some local unions like SEWA.

WHO IS STREET VENDOR?

"Street vendors are the embodiment of grassroots entrepreneurship, showcasing the spirit of selfreliance and resilience." - Narendra Modi

A street vendor is broadly defined as a person who offers goods or services for sale to the public without having a permanent built-up structure but with a temporary static structure or mobile stall (or headload). Street vendors may be stationary by occupying space on the pavements or other public/private areas, or

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WHAT SERVICE DOES THE STREET VENDOR PROVIDE?

The street vendors market many goods which common people use on a regular basis and vegetables are traditionally leading the trade. In addition to vegetables and fruits other commodities such as clothes and hosiery household goods and food items, manufactured by home based workers, who have no other channels of marketing the products that they produce.

VARIOUS LAWS, POLICIES AND SCHEMES FOR STREET VENDORS BY AUTHORITIES/GOVERNMENT OF INDIA

The Government of India recognizes the importance of street vendors in the urban economy and has enacted laws, formulated policies and implemented schemes to protect their rights and provide them with support. These initiatives aim to formalize street vending activities, address the challenges faced by vendors and promote their socio-economic well-being. Following are some of the key laws, policies and schemes implemented by the authorities in India:

- Street Vendors (Protection of Livelihood and Regulation of Street Vending) Act, 2014: The Street Vendors Act is a crucial legal framework that provides protection and regulates street vending activities. It aims to prevent the arbitrary eviction of street vendors and ensures their right to carry out vending operations. The Act mandates the formation of Town Vending Committees (TVCs) at the local level which is responsible for implementing the provisions of the Act such as issuing vending certificates and demarcating vending zones.
- National Urban Livelihoods Mission (NULM): The National Urban Livelihoods Mission launched by the Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs focuses on urban poverty alleviation and provides support to street vendors. Under NULM, various components such as skill training, access to credit, social security and capacity building are implemented to enhance the socio-economic conditions of street vendors.
- PM SVANidhi (Pradhan Mantri Street Vendor's Atma Nirbhar Nidhi) Scheme: PM SVANidhi is a scheme launched by the Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs to provide affordable credit to street vendors. The scheme aims to enable street vendors to resume their businesses, recover from the COVID-19 pandemic's impact and enhance their livelihoods. It offers collateral-free loans, interest subsidies and incentives for timely repayment.

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- Credit Guarantee Fund Scheme for Micro Units (CGFMU): The CGFMU scheme implemented by the Small Industries Development Bank of India (SIDBI) provides credit guarantee coverage to micro-enterprises including street vendors. Under this scheme, street vendors can access loans from banks and financial institutions without collateral or third-party guarantee thereby promoting financial inclusion.
- Swachh Bharat Abhiyan (Clean India Campaign): The Swachh Bharat Abhiyan launched by the Government of India aims to create a clean and hygienic environment. This campaign indirectly benefits street vendors by improving the cleanliness and sanitation infrastructure in public spaces where vendors operate. Access to clean and hygienic surroundings positively impacts their businesses and the overall well-being of the vendors and customers.
- Skill Development Initiatives: Various skill development initiatives such as the Skill India Mission aim to enhance the skills and capacities of street vendors. These programs offer vocational training in areas such as entrepreneurship, customer service, financial literacy and hygiene practices. Skill development initiatives empower street vendors to enhance their productivity, upgrade their businesses and explore new opportunities.

The Government of India has implemented several laws, policies and schemes to protect the rightsof street vendors, promote their livelihoods and facilitate their socio-economic growth. The Street Vendors Act along with schemes like PM SVANidhi and NULM provides a comprehensive framework for their support. These initiatives aim to formalize street vending, provide access to credit, ensure social security and enhance the overall well-being of street vendors. The government's efforts are geared towards creating an enabling environment where street vendors can thrive and contribute to the urban economy.

METHODOLOGY

This section outlines the methodology adopted for conducting a comprehensive study on streetvending practices, challenges, and opportunities. The study utilized a combination of **structured questionnaires** and **in-depth interviews** to gather empirical data and insights from street vendors and relevant stakeholders.

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Research Design

A mixed-methods research design was employed to ensure a well-rounded understanding of street vending dynamics. This approach allowed for the collection of both quantitative and qualitative data, providing a holistic view of the subject.

Data Collection Methods

• Structured Questionnaire

Structured questionnaire was used to collect quantitative data from a large number of street vendors across different geographical locations. The questionnaires were designed to capture information related to:

- Demographic details of street vendors (age, gender etc.).

- o Strategies employed by vendors to navigate legal and operational challenges.
- Opinions on existing policies and their impact on street vending.
- Suggestions for improving the street vending environment.

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• Ethical Considerations

Ethical guidelines were followed throughout the research process. Informed consent was

obtained from all participants, ensuring their voluntary participation. Anonymity and confidentiality were maintained in reporting the findings.

• Data Analysis

Data analysis is a crucial phase in research that involves examining collected data to identify patterns, draw conclusions, and derive meaningful insights. It is a systematic process that transforms raw data into organized and interpretable information, facilitating a deeper understanding of research objectives.



- About the study
 - The study has been conducted while considering sample Size of 60. The respondents involved in this study are from different vending categories and from different places basically from 4 key regions namely the industrial area of the city, semi-urban region, village and the center of the city so as to represent the district in fair and equitable manner.

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
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> How Familiar are you with the different Policies and Regulations framed for street vendors





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
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




> Are you registered under any scheme?



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
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Now that you know the benefits of getting registered as a street vendor, would you like to get registered?

A data analysis highlights an encouraging trend that about 73% of respondent street vendors express a willingness to register after learning about the associated benefits. This indicates the potential for increased formalization within this sector if comprehensive awareness campaigns are implemented,

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In conclusion, the combination of structured questionnaires and in-depth interviews provided a comprehensive understanding of street vending practices, challenges, and potential solutions. The empirical data collected through these methods formed the basis for analyzing the intricate dynamics of street vending and its interaction with legal and regulatory frameworks.

CHALLENGES FACED BY STREET VENDORS

Analysis of Challenges Faced by Street Vendors in the concerned Locality and NeighboringAreas

During the street vendor engagement initiative, a comprehensive analysis was conducted to identify the challenges faced by street vendors in the locality and neighboring areas. The following challenges were observed:

- Legal knowledge gap: Street vendors often lack awareness about their legal rights and obligations. This knowledge gap hindered their ability to navigate the legal landscape effectively and advocate for their interests.
- Access to registrations and identification cards: Many street vendors face difficulties in obtaining the necessary registrations, licenses and identification cards required for operating their businesses legally. The bureaucratic procedures, associated costs and lack of clarity in the application processes posed significant barriers.
- Harassment and eviction threats: Street vendors frequently encounter harassment from authorities, extortion by local enforcers and threats of eviction. These issues affect their livelihoods and create an atmosphere of uncertainty and insecurity.
- Lack of infrastructure and amenities: Inadequate infrastructure, including proper vending zones, sanitation facilities and storage spaces posed challenges for street vendors. The absence of basic amenities impacted their working conditions and compromised their ability to provide quality products and services.
- Limited financial resources: Many street vendors faced financial constraints, making it difficult to invest in their businesses, procure quality materials or access formal credit facilities. This has reduced their potential for growth and development.

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• Social stigma and marginalization: Street vendors often faced social stigma and were marginalized within the community. Negative perceptions and discriminatory attitudes affected their interactions with customers, local authorities and other stakeholders.

RESOLVING CHALLENGES

Street vendors play a vital role in the economy through provision of self-employment to millions of people. Street vending provides inexpensive and convenient access to daily need items to people. Still, challenges like poor literacy and skills, limited access to formal credit constraints, street vendor's ability to access emerging market opportunities, lack of legal recognition, poor infrastructure, harassment by authorities, and gender-based discrimination make them vulnerable to economic catastrophes.

How to resolve these challenges

- Street vendors in India face a major challenge of lack of legal recognition. Most street vendors operate in the informal sector and do not have legal permits to operate. This lack of legal recognition exposes them to harassment and eviction by the authorities, making it difficult for them to sustain their livelihoods. However, through implementation of policies, schemes and laws the government has ensured that street vendors do not face any harassment or eviction by authorities. Schemes and policies such as Pradhan Mantri Street Vendor Atmanirbhar Nidhi Scheme which provides access to affordable working capital loans to the vendors which can help them to resume their livelihoods Mission) etc.
- Moreover, by organizing awareness programs at different levels (sub district/district/state/national, for rural & urban street vendors) which assist the street vendors in getting equipped with the right information regarding the various schemes and policies launched by the government which are beneficial for these street vendors. Camps held at state level by regional governments are also observed to be beneficial. As it provides the vendors a platform where they can address their issues, get registered under policies and engage with

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- exacerbates the marginalization and vulnerability of street vendors, making it difficult for them
 to improve their livelihoods and incomes. This further perpetuates gender-based discrimination
 and social stigma against women's street vendors. To address this issue, there a need for
 greater access to skills development and training programs for street vendors, especially women
 street vendors. This can include capacity-building initiatives that provide training on business
 management, financial management, and marketing, among others, to enable women street
 vendors to improve their businesses and compete in the market.
- Moreover, there is a need for gender-sensitive training programs that address the specific needs and challenges faced by women street vendors. Tailoring the training programs to the needs and interests of men and women street vendors can enable them to improve their livelihoods and incomes.
- Furthermore, there is a need to promote entrepreneurship and innovation in the street vending sector. This can enable street vendors to leverage their skills and knowledge to improve their businesses and innovate new products and services that meet the needs of the market.
- By addressing the lack of skills and training for street vendors, we can create a more empowering and enabling environment for them, enabling them to improve their livelihoods and incomes with dignity and respect. This can contribute to poverty reduction and economic growth in the country
- Most street vendors operate in crowded and unhygienic spaces, with no access to basic amenities such as water, electricity, and sanitation facilities. The lack of proper infrastructure not only affects the health and well-being of street vendors but also impacts the quality of the products they sell, which can lead to loss of customers and income. In order for the street vendors to operate without any constraints, the government must allocate a specific area or zone to these street vendors wherein they can operate freely.
- Authorities should provide license to the vendors so that they can be protected by harassment and eviction by local authorities.
- Street vendors are not formally trained as the majority are illiterate. Local authorities should have to provide training to these vendors.

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• Authorities should provide permanent sheds for vendors and minimum facilities such as first aid, drinking water, toilet, garbage collection and solid waste disposal etc.

ASSESSMENT OF EFFECTIVENESS

Effectiveness of the street vendor engagement process

In achieving the objectives through the street vendor engagement process the assessment of the effectiveness of street vendor engagement, reveals several significant findings:

- Awareness of Rights and Government Policies: The legal aid committee has made commendable efforts in raising awareness among street vendors about their rights and various government policies. However, the survey results indicate that approximately 89% of street vendors remain unaware of these policies and regulations. This knowledge gap underscores the need for continued education and outreach efforts.
- **Grievance Resolution**: The committee has successfully resolved grievances for street vendors, but it's crucial to note that 63% of respondents reported harassment by authorities. This suggests that while progress has been made, challenges persist in ensuring that street vendors' rights are protected and respected.



• Lack of Government Initiatives: The survey revealed that 95% of street vendors believe that no government survey has ever been conducted to understand their needs and challenges.

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- Association Formation: Efforts to connect street vendors with an association have been taken by the legal aid committee of SRM University but hindered by the lack of means for registration and affiliation available in the district. Moreover, the absence of a formal association for street vendors is a significant gap, as such associations can play a vital role in advocating for their rights and interests.
- **Rural Street Vendors**: The assessment also underscores the need for policies and support structures for rural street vendors, as the challenges faced by them are similar, and existing policies primarily cater to urban vendors.

CONCLUSION

In conclusion, the committee's awareness program for street vendors has undeniably yielded positive outcomes, with vendors responding positively to the information shared and expressing their grievances. Also, the Street vendors were reassured about the follow-up action that would be taken up by the District Legal Service Authorities.

The Interaction with Street vendors gave an insight about the lives of the Street vendors and an understanding to the committee members of the working of the legal aid for welfare of street vendors. However, it's crucial to acknowledge that there are significant challenges that need to be addressed to ensure a more effective and inclusive approach to street vendor empowerment and protection.

The formation of associations among street vendors stands out as a critical step in this endeavor. These associations can provide a platform for vendors to voice their concerns collectively and access resources more efficiently. To achieve this, policymakers, along with the support of District Legal Service Authorities and NGOs, must actively work to bridge the knowledge gap, formalize these associations, extend government schemes to unregistered vendors, and ensure that rural street vendors receive equitable support.

By focusing on these key areas and actively involving street vendors in the decision-making process, we can pave the way for a more prosperous and secure future for street vendors across the region. The committee's dedication to addressing these challenges and facilitating the formation of associations is a commendable step toward realizing this vision, ensuring that street vendors canthrive and contribute to their communities while enjoying the protection and support they rightfully deserve.

NATIONAL LOK ADALAT

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

We had the privilege of participating in a Lok Adalat as volunteers, where our team contributed to the effective management of the event and played a significant role in *counseling the parties* involved. The Lok Adalat primarily focused on addressing two key categories of matters: bank loanrecovery cases and matrimonial disputes.

As a team assisting the District Legal Services Authority (DLSA), we played pivotal roles in ensuring the smooth execution of the Lok Adalat. This encompassed organizing *logistical aspects, coordinating with the concerned authorities,* and ensuring that the proceedings ran efficiently.

A significant portion of our involvement revolved around providing *counsel to the parties engaged* in the disputes. In the case of bank loan recovery matters, we offered *guidance* to debtors and creditors, promoting dialogue and negotiation to *facilitate amicable settlements*. For matrimonial disputes, we aided couples in *understanding their options* and encouraged peaceful resolution, ultimately aiming to *reduce emotional distress*.

Through our efforts, we successfully resolved a substantial number of cases in both categories. Theamicable settlements not only spared the parties involved from protracted legal battles but also contributed to the overall efficiency of the justice system.

Our participation in the Lok Adalat was a valuable learning experience. We gained insights into the significance of alternative dispute resolution mechanisms in alleviating the burden on traditional court systems. Moreover, we developed a deeper understanding of the complexities and nuances involved in bank loan recovery and matrimonial matters. The experience highlighted the importance of empathy, effective communication, and a proactive approach to achieving consensus among conflicting parties.

In conclusion, attending the Lok Adalat was an enriching and professionally rewarding endeavor. It reinforced the importance of community involvement and alternative dispute resolution methods, emphasizing the potential for resolving disputes in a manner that is fair, efficient, and, above all, amicable.

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INTRODUCTION

It goes without saying that the backlog of pending cases in the courts of India has severed the *faith* ofIndian citizens in seeking justice. Instead of waiting in queues for years and passing on litigation by inheritance, people are inclined either to avoid litigation or to start resorting to extra-judicial methods¹. As a measure to restore this faith and encourage speedy disposal of such myriad of cases, the Judiciaryhas been actively promoting various Alternative Dispute Resolution methods.

One such effective method is the concept of "Lok-Adalat." The literal translation of the Hindi moniker, Lok-Adalat means, "*People's Court*." The idea of Lok-Adalat was mainly advocated by *Justice P.N Bhagwati*, a former Chief Justice of India². Lok-Adalat is India's unique form of Alternative Dispute Resolution, which has proven to be a successful alternative to conventional litigation. It has been given a statutory recognition by the virtue of the Legal Services Authorities Act, 1987³.

The system of Lok-Adalat is based on the principles of Panch Parmeshwar of Gram Panchayats. Lok Adalat is a non-adversarial system, whereby mock courts are held by the State Authority, District Authority, Supreme Court Legal Services Committee, High Court Legal Services Committee or TalukaLegal Services Committee. It is a forum where voluntary efforts are aimed at bringing about settlementof disputes between the parties through conciliatory and persuasive efforts⁴.

Typically, a Lok-Adalat panel is a three-member panel who act as conciliators and are generally amongserving or retired judicial officers, social workers and advocates. Both pre-litigation and post-litigationefforts are invited by the Lok-Adalat. The Lok-Adalat can deal with all civil cases: matrimonial disputes, land disputes, property disputes, labour disputes and compoundable criminal cases. The award made by Lok-Adalat is deemed to be a decree of a Civil Court and is final binding on all parties. Camps of Lok Adalat were started initially in *Gujarat in March 1982* and now it has been extended throughout the Country. The evolution of this movement was a part of the strategy to relieve heavy burden on the Courts with pending cases and to give relief to the litigants who were in queue to get

justice. The first Lok Adalat was held on March 14, 1982, at Junagarhin Gujarat the land of MahatmaGandhi. Lok Adalat has been very successful in settlement of motor accident claim cases, matrimonial/family disputes, labor disputes, and disputes relating to public services such as telephone, electricity, bank recovery cases and so on. Some statistics may give us a feeling of tremendous satisfaction and encouragement. Up to the middle of last year (2004), more than 200,000 Lok Adalat have been held and therein more than 16 million cases have been settled, half of which were motor accident claim cases. More than one billion US dollars were distributed as compensation to those whohad suffered accidents. 6.7million Persons have benefited through legal aid and advice.

To witness such a session of Lok-Adalat, the students of SRM Law School, Delhi NCR. under the guidance of our teacher and Mentor, Mr. Ajeet Singh, were taken to the Sonipat District Court on September 8, 2023, to attend permanent Lok Adalat and on September 9, 2023, to attend national LokAdalat with the objective to gain first-hand experience of the same and develop a deeper sense of understanding of its functioning in reality. This report is an effort to elaborate on this practical experience and explain the legal aspects that are linked to it.

PURPOSE OF VISIT

The purpose of was to understand the working of a court, the nature of duties of the Judicial Officers in the matters of Lok Adalat and also to observe how the concept of conciliated settlement of dispute in the traditional Indian culture in the form of Nyaya Panchayats and Gram Panchayats led to introduction of Lok Adalat which added a new chapter to the justice dispensation system of the countryand that how it provides a supplementary forum to the victims for satisfactory settlement of their disputes. The visit helped us understand the actual functioning and coordination taking place in the Lok Adalat and that how it was beneficial to the people considering the advantages that came along and the disadvantages the parties had to face due to certain errors on the part of the court.

LEGISLATION WRT LOK ADALAT

The advent of Legal Services Authorities Act, 1987 gave a statutory status to Lok Adalat, pursuant tothe constitutional mandate in Article 39-A of the Constitution of India, contains various provisions for settlement of disputes through Lok Adalat. It is an Act to constitute legal services authorities to provide free and competent legal services to the weaker sections of the society to ensure that opportunities for securing justice are not denied to any citizen by reason of economic or other

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disabilities, and to organize Lok Adalat to secure that the operation of the legal system promotes justice on a basis of equal opportunity. Even before the enforcement of the Act, the concept of Lok Adalat has been getting wide acceptance as People's Courts as the very name signifies. Settlement ofdisputes at the hands of Panchayat Heads or tribal heads was in vogue since ancient times. When statutory recognition had been given to Lok Adalat, it was specifically provided that the award passed by the Lok Adalat formulating the terms of compromise will have the force of decree of a court which can be executed as a civil court decree.

PROCEDURE FOLLOWED

The procedure followed at a Lok Adalat is very simple and shorn of almost all legal formalism and rituals. The Lok Adalat is presided over by a sitting or retired judicial officer as the chairman, with two other members, usually a lawyer and asocial worker. It is revealed by experience that in Lok Adalatit is easier to settle money claims since in most such cases the quantum alone may be in dispute. Thus, the motor accident compensation claim cases are brought before the Lok Adalat and a number of caseswere disposed of in each Lok Adalat. One important condition is that both parties in dispute should agree for settlement through Lok Adalat and abide by its decision. A Lok Adalat has the jurisdiction to settle, by way of effecting compromise between the parties, any matter which may be pending beforeany court, as well as matters at pre-litigate stage i.e. disputes which have not yet been formally instituted in any Court of Law. Such matters may be civil or criminal in nature, but any matter relatingto an offence not compoundable under any law cannot be decided by the Lok Adalat even if the parties involved therein agree to settle the same. Lok Adalat can take cognizance of matters involving not only those persons who are entitled to avail free legal services but of all other persons also, be they women, men, or children and even institutions. Anyone, or more of the parties to a dispute can move an application to the court where their matter may be pending, or even at pre-litigate stage, for such matterbeing taken up in the Lok Adalat whereupon the Lok Adalat Bench constituted for the purpose shall attempt to resolve the dispute by helping the parties to arrive at an amicable solution and once it is successful in doing so, the award passed by it shall be final which I much force as a decree of a Civil Court obtained after due contest.

LOK ADALAT AWARD

One issue which raises its head often is the finality of the award of the Lok Adalat. During the LokAdalat, the parties agree to abide by the decision of the judge at the Lok Adalat. However, it is often

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seen that later, the same order is challenged on several grounds. In one of the recent decisions, the Supreme Court of India has once again laid to rest all such doubts. In unequivocal terms, the Court hasheld that the award of the Lok Adalat is as good as the decree of a Court. The award of the Lok Adalatis fictionally deemed to be decrees of Court and therefore the courts have all the powers in relation thereto as it has in relation to a decree passed by itself. This includes the powers to extend time in appropriate cases. The award passed by the Lok Adalat is the decision of the court itself though arrived to be the simpler method of conciliation instead of the process of arguments in court.

KINDS OF CASES TAKEN

- 1. Compoundable Traffic Challans
- 2. Loan Defaults
- 3. Divorce Cases
- 4. Electricity Bill Defaults
- 5. Cheque Bouncing Case

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OBSERVATION

As the students entered the premises of the Court, a brief introduction to the infrastructural aspects of the Lok-Adalat was given. One of the noteworthy points of the information imparted was that every court room had a police station (cell) adjoined to it, which was a manifestation of an effort made to ensure coordination between different agencies. A list of the number of Lok-Adalat panels, with the names of the panel members and the nature of the disputes to be heard was briefed upon. Further, in adialogue session with one of the senior authorities of the District Legal Services Authority the studentswere given additional details of the panel that ware going to hear matters related to banks, motor vehicles compensation, cheque bouncing cases, and a few criminal matters. The students were told thatthe panels were further divided into pre-litigation and litigation forums. An interactive session on the nature and provisions of the Legal Services Authorities Act, 1987 was conducted.

The senior authority also shed light on the success rate this form on alternative dispute resolution mechanism has achieved in the past years. They mentioned that the dedication among the legal fraternity is so much that they have successfully arranged mobile clinics- in which these panel memberstravel to various villages to resolve disputes. Students were divided into 8 groups as per the number of panels. The students of group 1 before entering the court room were informed that the panel intended to hear only banking matters of the pre-litigation stage. The court room had make-shift tents set up forvarious banks with their respective representatives and other litigants. It was informed to the students of a Court officer that the District Legal Services Authority on the receipt of application from any of the parties of the pre-litigation stage refer such matters to the Lok Adalat for amicable settlement.

These sessions are held usually on the 2nd and 4th Saturday of a month. The officer mentioned that thelitigants either represent themselves or through advocates to negotiate on the monetary value acceptable to both parties in banking matters. The lawyer is not obligated to present a '*Vakalatnama*' to the panel members on appearing on behalf of the litigant. Typically, in banking matters, the Bank issues a notice to the opposite party for payment of credit dues, or EMI etc, depending on the nature of transaction. On having communicated this, the party approaches the bank to provide justification for non-payments or to seek extension. If such a dialogue goes in vain, both parties agree to settle the matter through Lok-Adalat. The parties negotiate on the terms of compromise, which is usually a reduction in the interest rate, repayment of credit due in installments etc. This is done with assistance

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and input from the panel members, especially to seek clarification on points of legal value. Once the parties reach a conclusion, a "Compromise Form" is signed and submitted to the panelists, and it is optional on parties to pay token money. The party is given a 'no due certificate' by the Bank only afterthe repayment of the entire amount is made in consonance with the terms and conditions agreed uponbefore the panel members. However, there may be instances where the parties have approached the Lok-Adalat over previously settled matters, in which the payment has not been made by the same party. In such cases, the panel members seek to make further arrangements of compromise after hearingboth the parties. The reasons could be lack of financial resources, bankruptcy, personal etc. One suchcase is that of a farmer who had taken a loan from the bank but failed to make payment after a previousattempt to settle the issue. The panel members after much deliberation and questioning realized that the farmer's loan was taken to give dowry for his daughter's marriage and repayments in such a shortspan of time was not possible for him.

The Bank later sympathized with his condition and agreed to further reduce the rate of interest and extend the time period. On having a conversation with one of the bank representatives who deals withautomobile loans, it was clear that the Banks approached Lok Adalat not with the intention to take money by hook or crook but to settle the matter in an amicable manner. The representative informed us that usually there are internal guidelines given to them with respect to settling these issues. However, they can use their discretion in terms of reduction of interest value or extension of dates after considering the condition of the other party. They mentioned that the people of all economic strata likefrom the car owners of Maruti to the car owners of Mercedes Benz today willingly agree to settle the dispute with the help of Lok-Adalat for its efficiency. Although, much interaction with the panel members was not possible, the students gathered information by speaking to various litigants and bankrepresentatives. However, at the end of day students had a joint session with the panel members of Motor Vehicles Tribunal, recording the procedure and effective methods used by the panel members in resolving such disputes. Furthermore, a brief interaction with the authorities of the National Legal Services Authority (NALSA) marked the end of the trip.

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OBSERVATION (ROOM 10)

- 1. In the case of *Bank of Baroda Halalpur Branch V/S Ashish*, Ashish had taken a loan of Rs. 190,000 from the bank and was consistently paying all the installments. Unfortunately, in an unforeseen accident, Ashish passed away. The outstanding loan amount at the time of his demise was Rs. 129,087.29. Ashish's father subsequently settled the remaining loan balance bypaying Rs. 2,000, and the bank manager agreed to this settlement.
- 2. In the case of *SHGB Rethela vs. Jitender*, Jitender had taken a loan of Rs. 120,000 from the bank. However, his outstanding loan balance is currently Rs. 49,479, and his account has been classified as a Non-Performing Asset (NPA). Jitender has agreed to settle the loan by paying Rs. 5,000 to close the account.
- 3. In the case of SHGB Pugthala vs. Sheela, Sheela had initially taken a loan of Rs. 25,000 but did not make any installment payments. As a result, the outstanding loan amount has now reached Rs. 41,000. Sheela and the bank manager have come to an agreement to settle the outstanding loan by paying Rs. 10,000.
- 4. In the case of *Bank of Baroda vs. Naresh*, Naresh had initially taken a loan under the SMEs scheme, with a loan amount of Rs. 700,000. The outstanding loan balance stood at Rs. 546,120. After negotiations, both the bank manager and Naresh agreed to settle the outstanding loan bypaying Rs. 40,000. To initiate the settlement, Naresh paid Rs. 10,000 as token money.
- In the case of *Indian Bank V/S Naresh Kumar*, Naresh Kumar had an outstanding loan amount of Rs. 546,120. After negotiations, the bank and Naresh settled on a reduced amount of Rs. 350,000 to resolve the outstanding debt. As a gesture of commitment to the settlement, Nareshpaid Rs. 1,000 as token money.

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OBSERVATION (ROOM 2)

- 1. In the case of Anju and Pardeep, a married couple, have a pending divorce case in Lok Adalat and thus counselling was done. The wife's counsel has requested that the divorce can be withdrawn if the husband pays her a monthly sum of 15,000 from his salary to support her and cover household expenses. The husband's counsel, however, has agreed to a monthly payment of 12,000 while also taking on all expenses related to their children. The settlement was done, and divorce petition was withdrawn.
- 2. In the case of *Bebi Vs. Satpal*, Bebi, who was in her second marriage, had two daughters with Satpal. There were ongoing disputes and fights between them, leading Bebi to leave their marital home without informing Satpal. She also took gold jewelry and money with her and filed a domestic violence complaint against Satpal. Now, Bebi wishes to withdraw the divorce petition and reconcile with Satpal, but he is reluctant to take her back. After hours of counseling, the matter has been scheduled for the next court date.
- 3. In the case of *Ankit Vs. Tannu*, Ankit and Tannu had been married for several years, and they had a daughter together. Over time, their relationship began to deteriorate due to constant arguments and disagreements. Tannu decided to leave their marital home with their daughter, without informing Ankit, she subsequently filed a legal case against Ankit, accusing him of mistreatment and seeking custody of their child. However, after some time, Tannu had a change of heart and expressed her desire to reconcile with Ankit and work things out for the sake of their daughter and divorce petition was withdrawn.
- 4. In the case of *Anjali Vs. Parveen*, Anjali had a strained relationship with her daughter-inlaw, leading her to move to a separate house. Anjali's own daughter, who had gotten divorced, began living with her mother. Meanwhile, Parveen engaged in drinking and abusive behavior. Anjali eventually asked Parveen and her own mother to leave the house,

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reached an agreement to give their relationship another chance. They have decided to live together for a few months, hoping that this trial period will help them determine if their marriage can be mended and whether they can work things out.

5. In the case of *Raj Kumari Vs. Deshraj*, Deshraj was absent during the proceedings, leading to the matter being adjourned to the next scheduled date for further consideration.

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CONCLUSION

Based on legislative interpretation of the Legal Services Authorities Act, 1987 and various judicial pronouncements given by the Supreme Court of India and the High Court it is evident that the Lok Adalat system has been established with the objective to promote justice on the basis of equal opportunity. However, the objective of the Act shall be met only if it reaches the grass-root levels, meaning, more focus should be shed on access to Lok Adalat to the rural population. These rural LokAdalat should specially focus on the problems likely to be faced by such a population which could be disputes pertaining to agricultural loans, matrimonial disputes, labour issues etc. One such suggestionwould be the concept of mandatory "public hearing" in the rural set-up under an institutional set-up which could act as a precursor for a case to be taken up by Lok Adalat. This idea is inspired by the idea of "Jun Sunwai" programme of contract workers organized by Mazdoor Kisan Shakti Sangathan. The idea of these mandatory "Public hearings" is to ascertain whether a case can be settled by sending an application to Lok Adalat. These public hearings could have panel members who are social workersand lawyers who would be able to have a counseling session with these people before suggesting LokAdalat as a mode of dispute resolution. The idea is to exclude judicial officers in such hearings since they are already overburdened with work. Another advantage would be that this public hearing would filter the cases that are referred to Lok Adalat, that would prevent in wasting time of the Lok Adalat panelists. It is to avoid frivolous cases of clogging the machinery of Lok Adalat. It would help not in giving this rural population an opportunity to be heard at their own convenience but also to reduce thebacklog in cases because of the filtering mechanism. Jun Sunwai and Lok Adalat may act as a double-filter mechanism if used effectively. Also, another suggestion could be a permanent Lok Adalat set-upfor matters of all nature and not limited to Public Utility matters. If Lok Adalat has proven to be a successful alternative, then a permanent Lok Adalat for all matters would only prove to be a boon than bane. In conclusion, it can be said that awareness and literacy of such efforts such be given a priority by all institutions of society. For a progressive society, it is best to ensure that all citizens are aware of the judicial remedies available to them. And such a convenient dispute resolution mechanism as themshould be given a preference for speedy disposal of cases.

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METHODOLOGY

The study utilized a combination of **structured questionnaires** and **in-depth observation** to gather empirical data and insights from the inmates (male & female) and juveniles.

RESEARCH DESIGN

A mixed-methods research design was employed to ensure a well-rounded understanding of inmate's and prison dynamics. This approach allowed for the collection of both quantitative and qualitative data, providing a holistic view of the subject.

DATA COLLECTION METHODS

Structured Questionnaire

Structured questionnaire was used to collect quantitative data from a number of inmates from Sonipat District Prison. The questionnaires were designed to capture information related to:

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In-depth observations were conducted of male and female inmates. These observations aimed

Sample Selection

• Questionnaire Respondents:

A stratified sampling method was used to ensure representation from male inmates (60), female inmates (50) and children in prison below 5 years (5) & juveniles in juvenile home (20)

Ethical Considerations

Ethical guidelines were followed throughout the research process. Informed consent was obtained from all participants, ensuring their voluntary participation. Anonymity and confidentiality were maintained in reporting the findings.

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

⊳ Have you a received legal assistance or information related to your case while in imprisonment?


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About 51% of respondents affirmed that they received legal assistance and

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

Have you participated in any rehabilitation program aimed at improving life skills and reducing the chances to commit a crime again?


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About 93% of respondents confirmed to have participated in any rehabilitation program which had helped them to inculcate new skills and improve their life skills

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
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

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FINDINGS AND OBSERVATION

The visit to Sonipat District Jail provided a remarkable insight into a correctional facility that stands out for its commitment to cleanliness, discipline, and the overall well-being of its inmates. This particular facility houses both male and female wards, along with a special correctional home for juveniles. What was immediately striking was the absence of handcuffs, which is indicative of the emphasis placed on humane treatment and rehabilitation within the prison. Equally noteworthy is the absence of a specific uniform or dress code, allowing inmates to maintain a sense of individuality.

The prison environment is a testament to meticulous administration. It's not only clean but adorned with paintings that are skillfully created by female inmates. These artworks serve not only as decorations but also as expressions of the creativity that thrives even within the confines of incarceration. The prison administration's strict yet compassionate approach is evident in every facet of the facility's operation.

One particularly remarkable practice is the engagement of well-disciplined inmates in prison tasks. This system not only contributes to the facility's maintenance but also fosters a sense of responsibility among the inmates. Family time, during which inmates receive visits from their family members in a confined space under camera surveillance, speaks to the facility's commitment to maintaining connections with the outside world while ensuring security.

The extensive CCTV surveillance throughout the prison is a proactive measure to enhance safety and transparency. It ensures that every corner of the facility is monitored, reducing the risk of incidents and enhancing security for both inmates and staff. The existence of a grievance redressal body and a defense council within the prison administration demonstrates a dedication to addressing inmates' concerns promptly. These mechanisms serve as channels through which inmates can seek solutions to problems they encounter during their confinement, be it related to their living conditions or legal matters.

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The male and female wards, each housing around 60 inmates (males) and 58 (females), provide a wealth of opportunities for skill enhancement and rehabilitation. Inmates can participate in skill enhancement courses like painting and embroidery, equipping them with valuable skills that can aid

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in their reintegration into society. The presence of a legal aid cell within the prison is a vital resource for inmates seeking legal assistance, further supporting their access to justice.

One particularly touching aspect of the prison's approach is the accommodation of mothers with children aged five or below. In such cases, the prison not only provides a clean and hygienic living environment but also ensures that these children receive the right nutrition and education. This forward-thinking approach recognizes the need to maintain the mother-child bond, even in a correctional setting.

The inmate cells themselves reflect a commitment to hygiene and a sense of dignity. Each cell is equipped with a wooden bed that includes compartments for personal belongings, allowing inmates to maintain a semblance of privacy and organization in their living spaces. Furthermore, the absence of any elopement incidents in the past ten years stands as a testament to the success of the facility's approach to rehabilitation and security.

In conclusion, the Sonipat District Jail is a shining example of a correctional facility that prioritizes not only security but also the rehabilitation and well-being of its inmates. From cleanliness and discipline to opportunities for skill development, education, and family bonds, this prison embodies a holistic and humane approach to incarceration. Its commitment to maintaining the dignity of its inmates and ensuring their access to legal aid reflects a progressive and compassionate correctional system.

• CORRECTIONAL HOME FOR JUVENILES

The presence of a special correctional home for juveniles is a positive indication of the facility's commitment to addressing the needs of young offenders and providing them with a rehabilitative environment. While the safety and security protocols being strict and rigid may seem restrictive, they are primarily in place to ensure the safety of both the juveniles and any external individuals.

The fact that access to the correctional home is limited and that you could only observe it through a glass door underlines the priority given to protecting the privacy, security, and well-being of the juveniles. It's essential to strike a balance between transparency and the juveniles' right to privacy and

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protection.

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The presence of children of different age groups within the correctional home indicates the facility' s commitment to addressing the unique needs of each juvenile. This approach recognizes that the circumstances and rehabilitation requirements of young offenders can vary significantly based on their age and personal backgrounds. The correctional home can tailor its programs and interventions to address the specific needs of each child, thereby increasing the chances of successful rehabilitation and reintegration into society.

While the observation was limited, a glimpse into the correctional home underscores the complex and often challenging nature of working with young offenders. By maintaining strict security measures, the facility aims to provide an environment where the juveniles can grow, learn, and ultimately transition back into society as responsible, law-abiding citizens.

CHALLENGES ENCOUNTERED

It is evident that students' visits to the prison and interactions with jail administrative authorities were

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valuable experiences despite the challenges they faced. Their involvement under the DLSA, Sonipat during July and August allowed them to gain in-depth insights into the prison system through participant observation and meaningful interactions with the authorities. It is notable that the students diligently collected data during their visits, which is essential for understanding the dynamics within the correctional facility.

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It is unfortunate that safety concerns, including gun firing and other security issues, hindered the ability to conduct visits to the prison for a broader group. These safety challenges are, of course, paramount, and it's crucial to prioritize the well-being and security of all involved.

However, the fact that the visits occurred under the internships of students who are part of the core team is commendable. It speaks to their dedication and commitment to understanding the prison environment and contributing to the legal aid efforts. Even in the face of adversity and safety constraints, the students were able to make the most of their internships and gather valuable data that can be used for research, analysis, and future improvements in the prison system.

While it is regrettable that not all students could participate due to safety concerns, the data and insights collected by the core team are a testament to their determination to make a positive impact and contribute to the understanding of the prison environment. These experiences can be instrumental in promoting the objectives of legal aid and prison reform, ultimately leading to better conditions and support for inmates in the future.

IMPACT AND BENEFITS

Visiting a prison, interacting with the jail administration, and observing the inmates can have a significant impact and offer several benefits from various perspectives, including legal, societal, and educational. Here are some of the key impacts and benefits:

- Legal Aid and Support:

- Access to Justice: Inmates gain access to legal advice, assistance, and resources, helping them understand their rights, legal cases, and avenues for redressal. This promotes fair treatment within the justice system.

- Identification of Legal Needs: Observations and interactions help identify inmates with wrongful

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convictions, due process violations, or inadequate legal representation, leading to potential legal aid and case review.

In summary, our visit to the Sonipat District Jail has offered a rare glimpse into a correctional system that strives for a holistic, humane, and rehabilitative approach. It serves as a valuable example of a facility that is dedicated to upholding justice, rehabilitation, and the protection of inmates' rights, inspiring hope for further improvements in the broader criminal justice system.

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

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REPORT ON NGO VISIT

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On the 18th of October 2023, a group of 24 students from various academic years within the Law Faculty at SRM University, accompanied by the dedicated members of the Law Aid Committee, paid a visit to Umang Pathshala, an initiative operating under the umbrella of Disha Trust. Our visit served a dual purpose: firstly, to impart essential legal knowledge to the children and parents living in the challenging circumstances of brick kilns, and secondly, to closely examine the living conditions of these children, as well as the quality of education and hygiene provided to them.

During our visit, guided by Dr. Yatin, a faculty coordinator for the visit from SRM University's Law Faculty, our team interacted with the children and their parents to raise awareness about their legal rights. This interaction offered us valuable insights into their living conditions and the quality of education and hygiene offered by Umang Pathshala. This report aims to provide a comprehensive account of our visit, covering the legal awareness initiatives and the conditions faced by these children. It also explores the effectiveness of the educational and hygiene provisions at Umang Pathshala, and suggests ways in which our university can support this worthy cause to improve the lives of these underprivileged children and their families.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Disha Trust, founded in 2012, is a non-profit organization with a steadfast mission to combat one of the most pressing issues in India - the exploitation of child labor in brick factories. The organization's primary focus is on the Sonipat district of Haryana, where brick kilns are a prominent industry. Disha Trust's relentless efforts are directed towards enrolling the children of brick kiln workers into schools, thereby breaking the cycle of child labor. The location of Sonipat, Haryana, is significant, as it is a region where the conditions for these children are

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particularly challenging. They confront a stark reality filled with dust, barren landscapes, inadequate shelter, a complete lack of sanitation facilities, and a scarcity of basic amenities. It is within this challenging context that Disha Trust's mission unfolds, aiming to provide a glimmer of hope and a pathway to education and a better future for these underprivileged children.

The organization's activities, notably through Umang Pathshala, create a safe and friendly learning environment for these children. Education is supplemented with a strong emphasis on nutrition and hygiene. The aim is to not only educate but to provide a dignified and bias-free experience for these young minds, empowering them to break free from the cycle of child labor.

KEY FINDINGS

During our visit to Umang Pathshala, we made several significant observations and gathered valuable insights into the NGO's programs, impact, and challenges. These findings shed light on the realities faced by the children and their families, the limitations of the current education system, and the obstacles that hinder the provision of proper education.

- Limited to Primary Education: The primary observation made was that Umang Pathshala primarily offers primary education, and this education is provided by a single teacher. However, it was evident that these children need access to proper schools where they can be formally enrolled, as the current setup does not grant them the degree required to navigate future opportunities.
- Obstacle in Access to Formal Education: A major challenge identified is the lack of government schools in close proximity to the children's residences. Additionally, many of these children and their parents have their domicile in states other than Haryana, such as Bihar, which further complicates their enrollment in local schools, as family ID in Haryana is often required for admission.
- Perception of Child Labor: It was observed that some parents view child labor as an attractive option due to immediate financial gains. Earning around ₹300 per day as child labor might seem more lucrative compared to the monthly expenditure of ₹200 per

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family for education. This perception poses a significant barrier to encouraging parents to send their children to school.

- Hygiene and Infrastructure: Another critical observation was the lack of proper hygiene facilities for the children. The current conditions do not fully address the necessary requirements for the children's well-being.
- Outstanding Efforts by the NGO: Despite these challenges, Umang Pathshala, operating with limited resources, is doing commendable work. The presence of a dedicated teacher who is making efforts to engage the children as effectively as possible is noteworthy. The principle that "something is better than nothing" aptly characterizes the current situation.
- Aadhar Card Requirement: A significant hurdle identified is that most of the students do not possess an Aadhar card. Without this essential document, they are unable to access government schemes and benefits, further restricting their access to vital resources and services.

These findings highlight the complexities and intricacies of the challenges faced by Umang Pathshala and underscore the importance of addressing not only educational needs but also the legal and logistical barriers that impact the children's futures.





Additionally, interactive sessions were conducted where students had the chance to engage with industry professionals, asking questions and gaining further understanding of the hospitality sector.




